What about local transportation? How do I get from the airport to the hotel? Should I rent a car? Unless you plan to do some local sightseeing while you're in Houston (not that you'll have time!), there is little reason to rent a car. The hotel is within walking distance from an abundance of shopping and dining options. If you're planning on participating in the sports events, folks with cars line up in front of the hotel and offer rides to fellow participants. To get to the hotel from the airport, you can take the shuttle (a long ride, stopping at numerous hotels along the way), taxi (same price as the shuttle if shared with another person), or have a local friend pick you up. A good strategy is posting on the BratBoard (at www.aramco-brats.com/BratBoard) to share a ride with someone arriving at the same time.

If you're driving, please do so safely. When you arrive at the hotel, there will be three options for parking: I) hotel parking (expensive daily rate), 2) hotel valet (even more expensive daily rate), and 3) FREE parking in the garage immediately adjacent to the hotel's attached garage. Just ask the bellman at the front of the hotel when you pull up, and you will be directed around the corner to the free lot.

To enter, you pick the prize of your choice and drop your ticket in the corresponding bag. You note some extra special prizes. These are the items for the silent auction. Below each item is a list of bidders and their bid. If you want it, just add your name and a higher bid to the list. The highest bidder at the end of the ABI business meeting (where all are welcome to greet the newly elected board — you DID vote, didn't you? — and pose any questions or give feedback about our organization) wins the prize. Also on display are items for the live auction, which will be a part of the big dinner and dance on Sunday night. Get your bidding arm and checkbook ready!

Sunday night is the culminating event of the reunion — the dinner/dance. It's so nice to see everyone all dressed up a bit and wearing their gold. The atmosphere of shared origins and love for our childhood adventures is so thick it literally brings tears to your eyes. So often in your life since Arabia, you've felt out of place and a bit different. Not here. Here you are among friends and family and you feel more at home than you have in years. You listen to the thank yous to and from the ABI board and the reunion committee, enjoy a nice meal with your friends, laugh at the antics of the auctioneer, then as if you didn't know it would happen, you spend a ton of money to purchase a beautiful, Arabic-motif, handmade quilt. You don't mind having spent the money. You have a lovely handcraft that reminds you of home, and the ABI will have more money in its coffers to ensure that you'll have another reunion to attend in the future. After dinner, it's off to dance the night away.

Monday morning arrives before you're ready for it. It seems like you just went to bed. But wait! You DID just go to bed! How can it be over? It's been four days, but it seems like mere minutes. It's time to pack and say your last goodbyes. The cries of "oh my god" in the first days are replaced by another phrase familiar to reunion attendees,

"See you in two!" It's your new mantra, and you mean it.

As your taxi pulls away from the hotel, you have a different feeling in your stomach than when you arrived. This time it is a gut-wrenching sorrow that you've felt but one other time in your life, and that was when you left "home' for the last time. But there is a bright spot this time. In just two years, you'll be able to "go home" again by attending the next reunion. Be prepared for a few things when you get home: the desperate need to catch up on sleep and a bout of the post-reunion blues. The blues are easily remedied by signing up for BratChat, BratBoard, and keeping in touch with the old and new friends you saw at the reunion. PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Late January, I was offered an amazing opportunity to go "home" again after 40 years. The National Council on US-Arab Relations invited me to be part of a 12-person delegation. The primary purposes were to reacquaint ourselves with the Kingdom, as well as to update and broaden our connections. Although I felt quite guilty about traveling without all of you, I'm very pleased that

I went since my presence on the trip was in some respect, on behalf of all of you. The Council of Saudi Chambers of Commerce and Industry was our primary sponsor and in-country coordinator, and Saudi Aramco was our host for the visit to the Eastern Province. My family and friends were concerned about my safety on this trip. I wasn't, and can unequivocally say that at no time did I feel uncomfortable or threatened. After all, I was home.

Like many of you, I truly appreciate what a gift it was

spending my childhood in Saudi Arabia. This opportunity to rediscover my favorable memories and impressions of life in the Kingdom was an unexpected, but welcome and incredible experience.

I was honored to have the company of two other Brats—Mary Martin-Venker and Mark Mowbray—as well as teacher Sue Koenig. The

rest of the group was comprised of John

Duke Anthony, President and CEO of the National Council, and annuitants Bill and Karen Irwin, Marland and Maryln Townsend, Bert and Joan Golding, and Laney and Mary Ann Littlejohn. Keeping with our truly Brat tradition, we all became close friends in the short amount of time we had together.

Because of adverse weather, the trip from Washington, D.C., to Riyadh took us over 25 hours. After being warmly greeted, I made my way to my hotel room exhausted. I immediately turned off the air



conditioner, opened my window and fell into a sound sleep. I was awoken in the morning by the sound of the call to prayer, and I breathed the warm pleasantly fragrant Saudi air and knew that I was "home" once again. This made me smile.

Our time in Riyadh and Jeddah was filled from early morning until late evening with meetings with representatives of the Ministries of Planning and Petroleum, the leadership of the American Business Groups, selected officials of the American Embassy, and current Saudi Aramco representatives. Having never been to either of these cities I didn't have any memories to compare, but

> I was in awe at how large both cities were, at the new and old architecture, at the many banners put up about combating terrorism, at the warmth and friendliness shown to us by each and every person we encountered. I was humbled by the hospitality, the warmth, the intelligence, the astuteness, the articulation, and the love of both countries (USA and KSA) that every single official we met with had. When people ask me what is the main message I want to

> We spent 3 1/2 days in the Eastern Province. Again, we were met with the utmost hospitality and warmth. Seeing Brat friends was one of the highlights of the trip. My special thanks goes to the Owens families for



taking care of us in our spare time. Meeting with high officials and employees that remembered my father touched my heart. We visited Dhahran and Al Khobar and some of us were able to take a side trip to Ras Tanura. A lot has changed—and yet, some things remained the same within Dhahran. The dining hall looks the same

different than us—they have the same concerns about

family, economics, friends, life and terrorism that we do.

from the outside. The homes looked smaller than I remembered. Steinke Hall and Hamilton House looked the same from the outside. The new admin buildings smothered the old. The clinic looked the same from the outside but had expanded



tremendously. The commissary looked the same from the outside, but there were lots of other things around it that weren't familiar. The school I went to is now surrounded by a high wall with guards at the entrances. There are 3 or 4 main gates (wasn't able to take pictures of any). The

fenced-in area is much much larger than before, I couldn't figure out exactly where the old perimeter fence had been. The playground had grass and new equipment (the tall slide gone), I knew it was the same place and yet, it was so very different. The King's Road ball field is in the same place but has grass and other things that made it look different.

RT was where I lived most of my childhood. I admit to getting teary-eyed at the changes. My old home was gone. Houses on either side were standing. It is like a ghost town. At least half the homes are empty. The beach wall was mostly gone and grass was growing between where the beach wall used to be and the sandy beach. The bowling alley is now the library, the library is now the pool hall. A new bowling alley was built onto the side of the Surf House. Nobody was around. It doesn't look like the area is used for "kids" to hang out. If I didn't know I was there I would have sworn that it was not the Surf House.

One of the highlights of the trip was our trip to the remote desert oil facility of Shaybah in the Rub' al-Khali (Empty Quarter), where we wiggled our toes in the soft red sand, climbed sand dunes, watched the sunset, and feasted in Arabic tradition in a tent overlooking the facility. Again, the hospitality and warmth far exceeded anything I have ever experienced in the United States.

As a Brat, I know the intensity of our continuing interest in Arabia. As I walked around and spoke with people, I tried to listen better, look harder, and remember better because I knew that I wasn't simply visiting for myself, but for all of you. The trip brought back many memories and emotions that reached back to an earlier part of my life—something that only you could understand.

The mostly empty streets of Ras Tanura showed me what was missing—the presence of other Brats. I see that it wasn't only the town and the beach and the perimeter fence and the suq and the square hamburgers, and the shamals, and everything that I miss. It is mostly my friends—and your friends. And there is a cure for that. Coming up is the Brat reunion in Houston where we all can return "home" for a weekend and rekindle the friendships of our youth.

The ABI and the Reunion Committee work very hard this time of year in the hopes that they are preparing a "chance of a lifetime" trip for all of you. We can't thank the committee (Marie, Penny, Osama, Andrew, Lisa, and James) enough for all the time they are spending planning special surprises and paying attention to the fine details of registration. Our Publications Director

(Dean) is busy working on this newsletter and the 2005 ABI Directory; our Webmaster (Michael) is constantly updating the reunion details on the website; our Treasurer (Cathie) is checking her overloaded mail box almost daily and keeping good track of who owes what; our VP (Mike) is working on some ideas that we hope to surprise you with in the

near future and handled official business in my absence; our Reunion Oversight Director (DiK) is always in the background guiding and answering questions that the committee might have, and she has begun research for the 2007 reunion location; our Database

Additionally, we will be posting a long list of Middle Eastern restaurants, complete with a map and contact information.
- Get-together at a local classmate's home
- Get-together in a classmates suite/room
- Picnic in Memorial Park— Load up on gourmet goodies to go at Eatsie's (just across the street from the hotel), throw some beer and drinks into a cooler, and head over to Memorial Park for a pleasant evening outdoors.

Reunion Basics—Revisited

For the first time ever, you can register for the reunion by visiting the ABI website (Aramco-Brats.com). Just fill in the web form blanks, and the info will be automatically added to the reunion committee's registrant database. Due to the automation with this method, the committee urges Brats to utilize the on-line registration process. While we wish we could also offer the ease of credit card payments, we decided that that option added too much expense to the reunion and ABI budgets. Thus, you will have to mail your registration fees to Penny, of the Houston Reunion Committee.

IMPORTANT NOTE: If you have not yet paid your administrative baksheesh (AdBak) for this term, be sure to include it with your registration fees. This monetary support of the ABI must be paid in order to attend the reunion. If you are unsure whether you've paid for this term, contact Cathie McCoy, ABI Treasurer, at cathie@aramco-brats.com. For those more comfortable with regular mail, fill out the forms on pages 7, 10 and 11, and send them with the appropriate fees to the address given.

We expect record attendance for the Houston reunion. Space at the Sunday night banquet is limited, as is Aramco Services' generous subsidy. Plus, those who dally beyond March 31 will have to pay late fees and risk not getting the official reunion shirt and other registration freebies. Register NOW, so you don't miss out!


